I confess there are a lot of things I don't know about CSC. I don't know how to calm Ricky after a nightmare. I don't know the best approach to help Andrea with her reading. I don't know all the Bible verses the kids have memorized. (I recently emphasized something with the older children using Galatians 2:20. Imagine my surprise when the group of 25 or so began to recite the words with me!)

I also know very little about how to take care of our residents with special needs. What with medications, feeding, and bathing, these dear ones would be in a desperate situation if I was expected to meet their needs. It takes a lot of work, patience, and know-how to do the job well.

The other night I needed to grab something left

for me at the Duterte Home—in Ginda's room. Sometimes her room has two or three aunties conducting the various tasks for Ginda's care, but on this night it was quiet. The bustle of her day was done. She was fast asleep.

I stopped before I walked out to look at her sleeping. I saw the evidence of CSC's love around Ginda. Her oxygen tube was set just right. She was surrounded by pink, her all-time favorite color. Her doll had been laid next to her, and she was



made as comfortable as possible with pillows and blankets. Spending a day in a wheelchair can be hard on a body, and this setup seemed the perfect response.

Every day that same love is given to Ginda. In various ways, it is replicated for all the children.

It's true, hard as it may be to admit, that there is a lot I don't know about CSC. There is a lot I don't have to know. An exceptional team has every detail covered.

-STEPPING UP TOGETHER - by Paul Healy, Field Director Relief report

Reluctant relief workers. That term might describe the efforts of our staff during the months since two natural disasters hit the Philippines. We are reluctant, not because we aren't concerned, but because we lack know-how and experience in disaster relief. But in spite of that, CSC personnel have been active in extending help to families filled with rice, canned goods, water, housing materials, and tools. The truck and one of our jeeps were driven onto a large ship and taken to the island of Leyte. From Biliran Island in the north to Hilongos in the south, they went up and down the western seaboard of Leyte bringing hope to families whose lives were turned upside down. Carmelita

spearheaded relief efforts in northern Cebu. We were able to give Dennis \$11,000 to build homes in Cebu. In addition to these efforts, we have given cash assistance to several of our workers to help rebuild their family homes in various parts of the Philippines.

CSC is made up of people who care. Our staff showed



victimized by the October 15 earthquake that rocked Bohol island and Cebu, and the November 8 typhoon that brought destruction to the island of Leyte, as well as northern Cebu.

Central Cebu was spared from significant destruction and loss of life with both disasters, but our generous and loving supporters donated money to help the victims. So we responded.

Carmelita Baya, our senior social worker, led the charge to Leyte, bringing food, water, and construction materials to 10 families whose homes had been damaged or destroyed by typhoon Haiyan. They are families of our workers, as well as birth families of children adopted from CSC. We rented a large cargo truck that we also traveled to northern Cebu to bring similar assistance to families on our own island.

Money has continued to come in from thoughtful CSC donors. Former CSC residents held fundraisers. Churches took special offerings. Regular CSC supporters added overand-above gifts for typhoon or earthquake relief. To make sure the money got to people who needed it most, we partnered with two missionary friends who are extending major relief aid in Levte and Cebu. Paul Varberg, a Converge BGC missionary, lives and works in Tacloban, Leyte, the worst-hit area in the country. We were able to give Paul more than \$15,000 to rebuild homes.

We also teamed up with Dennis Nordine, a Cebu-based BGC missionary who has

that through their enthusiastic involvement in praying, planning, and carrying out relief efforts. And our supporters expressed their concern and love through their financial gifts, even though CSC did not prompt people to give. We recognize that we are an organization with lots of skill and experience in caring for homeless children, but not much in terms of relief programs. We hope and pray that we will not gain additional experience in the coming months and years!

Thanks to all who gave and prayed, and for those who give faithfully to help us reach out to other victims: the children who have lost their parents and need us so desperately.

-SPEECH THERAPY-Time with Tara

Time with Tara is time well spent. She is a professional speech and language therapist who volunteers with CSC. Tara does assessments, helps train our therapists and writes reports that are used in presenting our children for adoption. She lives in Hong Kong, but comes regularly to Cebu to work with our kids and staff. **She is a high energy person who loves our children deeply, and always has a lot of great ideas for treating those who struggle with speech.**

Danilo is one of her favorite kids to spend time with. He is a nine year-old bundle of energy who has a cleft palate and major speech challenges. Danilo started speech therapy in October of 2012, on Tara's recommendation. He loves his therapy, and they are working on articulating /g/, /p/, /b/ and



/h/ sounds. The structure of his mouth causes him difficulty in speech, and there is air that comes out of his nose when attempting some sounds. Tara has recommended assessment for surgery on his palate and continued work with CSC's therapists.

Danilo loves his time with Tara, as do the other CSC children. We are so thankful that God brought her to us!
