with a family! Recently they were told about this exciting development, and the emotion was overwhelming as the staff gave them the news they had been waiting and praying for. Now they will be watching for the day their new parents pull into our green gates to bring them home.

Adelyn and Janice came to CSC in July of 2006, together with their two brothers. They had a very difficult past; their mom had

died, and their father, despite working hard as a driver, could not provide for their basic needs. They had known sickness, hunger, and despair. At CSC they were given good food, a safe place to live, loving caregivers, and a chance to go to our Children of Hope School.

As the years passed the four siblings prayed fervently for a family. It was so difficult to wait. Friends and housemates came and went, even large sibling groups. Was God hearing their prayers? Did he have a family

> for them? Things became even more discouraging when the two boys eventually aged out of adoption eliaibilitv in the United States. The CSC staff wrestled with the idea of

placing Adelyn and Janice in an adoptive home without their brothers. After further counseling and soul searching, we decided to pursue adoption for the girls. Months later, a family heard about them, inquired with their agency and



Three of my four kids have been involved in track and field at school. One, whom I won't name here, has taken a lot of family teasing for a tendency to look up in the stands and smile during the 100-meter dash. My wife, Theresa, and I liked that approach better than the coaches did.

Our kids have been sprinters, long jumpers, and relay team members. I've always found the job of a relay runner especially interesting. In a relay, running isn't the only thing that matters. In fact, I'd guess most relay teams spend a lot more time practicing the baton pass than anything else about the race. Many well-timed steps need to take place when a baton goes from one hand to another's.

While it's not happening suddenly, we can't help but recognize the baton passes happening at CSC in this stage of our ministry. One was passed when Paul Healy asked the board to move the President title from under his name and over to the U.S. office nearly five years ago. That became my new role. Passing the baton continues with the retirement of Filipino leaders, like Warlita, who turn over medical duties to other qualified leaders, like Arlyn (page 5). And, of course, it continued when we celebrated Sandy Swanson's years of service in September.

CSC has had some goodbyes lately, and those come with the territory when an organization is 36 years old. No one really likes goodbyes, but they've led to other "hellos," and that's been encouraging. One such hello goes out to our new Child Development Director, Lindsay Hoeft. Lindsay is a licensed therapist and led our counseling department for four years. She has a new baton in her hand now and is very much up to the task. Let's pray for all the CSC folks passing and receiving batons in the coming years.

I rejoice that ultimately we are all in God's hands—hands that will never let us drop.

- Our cash position is strong enough that we don't anticipate any delayed monthly wire transfers to Cebu.
- Our supporters have given more this year than last year.
- The banquet met budget, and Foster Friend givers are beating budget by 15%.

- We are 6% behind our budget. We have \$65,000 to make up as we pull into the biggest quarter of the year.

It came down to the wire. The adoption paperwork needed to be processed by the U.S. government before Adelyn turned 18 years old this month. It was approved on the final day before her birthday!

Although this outcome wasn't what CSC staff imagined when the children came to live here back in 2006, we are thanking God for his perfect plan. The boys are happy for are thankful for the resources CSC has developed over the years. Each of our children participate in regular counseling sessions, and the boys will have the chance to talk with someone who cares about them regarding the transition--just as their sisters will. In addition, CSC has the Teen Home program, a residential care program that houses young adults who are not adopted. The residents of

this home do not have to leave CSC at any set age, but depart only when they have completed high school, and usually college or trade school, and are ready to live on their own. The adoptive parents are well aware of the situation with the four and are committed to including the boys in the girls' lives, even though they will be thousands of miles away. This will be a uniquely blended family that God put together, and we on the staff feel honored to have been a part of it.

Soon Adelyn and Janice will be leaving Cebu with their new parents. The watching and waiting will be over for them. For others it will continue as they wait for God's perfect timing to happen in their lives. Pray for the children as they wait, for the staff as they help them to be patient and trusting, and for the families that are needed to take them in. We thank God for his work in all of this, changing lives and building families.

In addition, she had several years of experience as a nurse in the Middle East, working with the royal family of Saudi Arabia. When Arlyn returned to the Philippines, she wanted to use her talents and experience to serve God in a Christian ministry. CSC has been a great fit for her and now it is time for her to move into a leadership position, working with CSC's Medical Director. Marlys Healy, to lead our team of five nurses as they provide the best possible medical care for our children.

In addition to her nursing skills, Arlyn is a talented public speaker, trainer of child care workers, and teacher of hygiene to CSC children. Her husband, Fred, is a pastor and evangelist with the Southern Baptist Conference of the Philippines. They have three children, two of whom are serving in the Philippine military.

We are thankful for Arlyn, her talents and dedication, and her willingness to take on leadership responsibilities of our medical team. And thanks to God for filling the slot left when our dear Warlita moved into retirement.

Academic progress, behavioral problems, and social adjustment are common topics. We also have a representative from therapy if the child is receiving physical, occupational, or speech therapy. It is encouraging to see the progress each child makes. It is also fun to see the personality of each child come through in the conferences.
