Today we stood in the picnic area as we sang our traditional farewell song to Thomas and his adoptive family. One of our child care employees, Gina, was openly weeping. She had given so much of herself to this little boy named Thomas during his six years at CSC. She read to him, held him, comforted him and prayed for him. She cared for him in the hospital and watched him on the playground. Now she was having to say goodbye. It was an emotional farewell.

One of the things about an anniversary celebration like we enjoyed last month here in Cebu, is that you tend to look for red letter dates to chart God's goodness over the years. For CSC many of those dates have Thomas' name on them. Major surgeries in Manila and

Cebu. Amazing acts of courage and recovery. Great accomplishments at school and in his home (Duterte). Hilarious statements and observations about life. And now, the answer to his and our fervent

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prayers – a family of his own. What had seemed impossible a few years ago came true in glorious fashion today as the CSC van pulled out of our compound with Thomas and his adoptive parents waving goodbye.

He required prolonged one-on-one aftercare, which meant that the house parents and Homelife staff had to make schedules that always had our aunties available to be with Thomas. His needs compelled us to provide necessary therapy, medical consultations and counseling. The intelligence and depth of his questions and observations

New Kids:

ELYSHA had been surrendered by her birthmother, who was unable to care for her. We received a call from a social worker on another island saying they could not find a place for Elysha because all of their shelters were full. Our team drove to the southern tip of Cebu and took a ferry to that island to pick up this little one and bring her back to CSC. Although the trip was treacherous through winding mountain roads, the team had this sweet face smiling at them. Elysha has been doing well in the Duterte home, and we are honored to be a part of her story.

Almost two-year-old **VICTORIA** is the newest girl at the Duterte house. She came from a town in southern Cebu. Her mother has been very ill, so Victoria had been cared for by an elderly priest, a distant relative, and a local teenager from the neighborhood. It was decided that she needed consistent care, so she was brought to CSC. Victoria had pneumonia upon admission, so she stayed in our medical facility before she got the chance to meet her new buddies in the Duterte nursery.

MATTHEW came to us as a newborn. His mother is very young and is unable to care for him. Upon arrival, he moved in to the nursery in our Cherne home. Having such a little one is both a joy and a challenge, but our childcare employees have given him all the things a newborn needs: nourishment, security, and lots of snuggles. We love to see the changes in Matthew as he grows.


MARK ANTHONY, four years old, is adjusting to the daily routine in Eicher Home. He was abandoned by his mother, so his grandparents had been caring for him. They lived on the streets and had no income. A concerned citizen reported the situation, and Mark Anthony was placed in a nearby shelter. This shelter does not allow boys over the age of five, so when he turned four years old, they contacted us and asked if we would care for him. Mark Anthony has mild hearing loss and also has some speech delays, which make his adjustment a little more difficult. Despite this, Mark Anthony is doing quite well. He is a quiet and sweet boy who is bonding with caregivers and making new friends.

FORD AND ROB are two-year-old twin brothers who were admitted to CSC this spring. Their birthmother had contacted us

to ask us to care for them because their living situation was unsafe. We have taken them into our care and are tending to all of their medical, nutritional and developmental needs. Ford and Rob have adjusted well at the shelter and are developing well.

JON JOSEPH is eight years old. He lived with his young mother in the fish market, where he was exposed to extreme poverty and crime. His mother couldn't care for Jon Joseph, so he came to live at CSC, joining his two younger twin brothers who had come to CSC three months earlier. Their mother is getting help from the government and is now living in a safe place. Jon Joseph had parasites when he first arrived, but we treated him, and he soon moved in to the Eicher Home. He is articulate and bright and is overjoyed to be reunited with his little brothers.

Recently left:

THOMAS is the little boy highlighted on the cover of this newsletter. Thomas came to us as an infant, and it was obvious fairly quickly that he had major medical issues. He spent many weeks in hospital rooms, getting his blood drawn or being taken to various appointments. He eventually underwent major surgery on his brain and nasal passages. Thomas waited for a family to adopt him and his prayers were answered. He now lives in Arizona with his new adoptive family.

ELISE was recently adopted! He left CSC for his new life in Sweden just before his third birthday. Elise came to us as an infant and developed so much during his time with us. Elise is a joyful child and gives an easy smile to anyone who speaks to him. He is vocal and easily expresses his emotions and needs. We are thankful for this new journey in his life and pray for his attachment.

EPIFANIO (JUNJUN) recently turned 18 years old. At CSC, children do not have to leave CSC when they turn 18 and are too old to be adopted legally. We have a teen/young adult program, and we work to help our young adults learn to be independent and successfully emancipate. In JunJun's case, he has an older sister who was too young to care for him a few years ago, but now that she is older and JunJun is older and more mature, the option for him to move in with her opened up, and we are so excited for this opportunity for him. Please pray with us for JunJun's major life adjustment.
