At one point, the two hospitals nearby were both full, as illness swept through the city. Through a difficult time, everyone pulled together to make sure that our children got the care they needed.

We had to close the gate to anyone but staff for a while as 54 children were isolated in our infirmary and three were hospitalized. Volleyball games on the playground were reduced It was a stressful time for Medical Director Marlys Healy and her faithful team of nurses, and for Homelife Director Jinkee Reasoner, as her team scrambled to find child care employees for infirmary and hospital duties. At one point, the two hospitals nearby were both full, as illness swept through the city. Through a difficult time, everyone pulled together to make sure that our children got the care they needed. And our wonderful infirmary, though stretched to the limit, served us well and helped prevent the further spread of the virus.

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FROM THE DESK OF TIM HOLMBERG, CSC President

There is often no better way to express the impact of the Children's Shelter of Cebu than to hear it from one who experienced it. What follows is a short excerpt from a former resident's story.

"I was six years old, and I don't remember much about my arrival at CSC. I didn't know what CSC was going to be like, but I knew that it would be safe. I didn't have that before. When my brothers and I arrived, the aunties helped us settle in, and we got to clean up. That was the day I learned what a shower was. That night they gave us toothbrushes. We didn't know what they were for. Someone brought coloring books to our room. We had never seen one before. I remember coloring page after page. We had never been on monkey bars or swings, on bikes or roller skates, shot a basket or kicked a soccer ball. I didn't know any of these things even existed.

I wanted to try everything. It was at CSC that I was able to be a little girl again. My big concern was what toy to play with, not what we were going to eat, or how I was going to make it. At CSC I got to eat three meals a day, take a shower, and have my own bed. I got to go to school and learn. My birthday was celebrated with cake and ice cream and gifts. Before that I didn't even know how old I was. I learned that Jesus cares for orphans, that he sees them and does not forget them. I learned my significance and my worth.

I want you to know that you made an impact on me in the four years I lived at CSC, and you continue to make an impact on so many children's lives. Thank you for your enduring and selfless support."

CSC celebrated 40 years of ministry this summer. For many the end of the year is a special time of giving. We ask that you include CSC in your plans as we look forward to another 40 years of providing hope and family to homeless children in Cebu.
