After some delays arriving in the country and a very tense moment at immigration, they finally got to meet their son!

Hugh, like all children his age, was curious and shy when he first met his family. Could this really be the same people in all of the photographs and Skype meetings? After more than a year of virtual contact, Hugh warmed up quickly. The shyness melted away into hugs and high fives in no time. The family played games together

in our Gleddie building while Hugh happily held a plush green dinosaur, a gift from his new parents and his new older sister. Normally families can play in CSC's playground or bond while running around the large grassy area between our homes. But during this time of lockdowns and quarantines, this meet-up took place in CSC's conference room. Even still, the smaller space couldn't diminish the love, joy, and happiness felt by everyone present.

After a heart-felt farewell ceremony, they drove out of our green gates and down the windy road that leads away from the shelter. Hugh was wide-eyed as he looked at his surroundings—another new

experience! Through the entire car ride, he held his new sister's hand and wore a smile on his face. The excitement of the day eventually wore him out, and halfway to the hotel he fell asleep, surrounded by his new family.

his life. His mom was beside herself with worry, as she was unable to buy the medicine he needed. We bought the needed antibiotic, and Jessie eventually recovered. And CSC began a relationship with the Martinez family.

When we began taking children in, we needed an employee to help. We had gotten to know LitLit Martinez and she became CSC's very first official Filipino employee. Soon, as we began taking in more children

had 11 employees from the Martinez clan over the years. CSC appreciates the hard work and dedication of these employees. And it's been an incredible blessing for all of these employees, who have earned a good living for their families, being able to climb out of poverty and provide their children the opportunity to go to school and live in decent housing. (Five Martinez family members received homes through the Habitat project.)

In 1979, when the ministry started in Bulacao, and before we began taking in children, we helped struggling families in our neighboring communities, helping malnourished and sick children get the food and medicine they needed. One of the families we helped was the Martinez family. The youngest, Jessie, was in the government hospital with pneumonia, fighting for

One of the big topics around the world during the pandemic has been education. How can children continue to receive a good education and stay safe at the same time? Thankfully, at CSC we can answer this question quite easily. God has blessed us with amazing facilities, and we have dedicated teachers willing to volunteer to stay inside the shelter during the lockdown.

In March when our lockdown began, we were starting our fourth and final quarter of school. Cris Tabra, our principal, and two other teachers taught our nearly 60 school-age children. It was all hands on deck as social workers, aunties, nurses, and houseparents all helped out to finish the school year with success! More teachers were added during the summer break to help organize structured projects and activities for the children and to prepare for the coming school year.

Then, at the beginning of August, we started our 2020-2021 school year. More living rooms, offices, and a gazebo were converted into classrooms, and the teachers creatively figured out how they could use their curriculum and teaching resources.

Our amazing teachers educate our children daily as CSC goes into the eighth month of lockdown. We have had to combine a few of our grades into one bigger class due to having fewer teachers, but despite that, we are continuing to see great progress and growth from our students!

Our preschool class, consisting of eight children ages four and five, are working with Teacher Cris in the Therapy Room, which

is located under the Duterte home. Michael and Shine, two of our older residents at the shelter, assist Teacher Cris in the morning with the preschool class and then work on their high school studies in the afternoon and evening. They are a great help in the classroom as they know the preschoolers well, and the students like the extra attention!

The other classes are spread out around the CSC campus, with most classes



meeting in the living rooms and dining rooms of the three houses. The students have been very helpful in moving furniture around daily to "create" their classroom and then putting things back so the spaces can be used for lunchtime.

The main stars of this school year have been our students. Although most of them don't understand the full weight of a worldwide pandemic, they have stayed positive and look forward to class each day. This year we have 37 students who attend Cebu Children of Hope School (CCHS) for preschool through sixth grade. We also homeschool our high school students, who have not been able to attend their regular classes at a local high school. We have 20 high schoolers, this year which is more than CSC has ever had in its 41 years of service.

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If you were at the shelter peeking into the different classes, you would see amazing lessons happening just like any other school year. Last week Teacher Bryan's second graders saw butterflies break out of their cocoons (the houseparents and aunties in the Duterte home also loved seeing this amazing process). The third graders in Teacher Michelle's class were venturing around the shelter, trying to classify living and nonliving things. During math class, Teacher Lyrah's first graders were using beans

to figure out what numbers can be combined to make "6." Our fifth and sixth graders were working together during science to answer the question, "How can you use engineering to solve a problem?" God's grace is seen daily at the shelter in all of the classrooms with students reaching new heights and understanding new things about themselves and the complex world that God made.
