— MEET ZACARIE, AGE 11

In July of 2019, Zacarie and her siblings were referred to CSC. They had been living in a different shelter for five years. Because of

injured her left arm. Upon meeting Zacarie, one of CSC's social workers noticed that her left arm wasn't straight. The caretakers

When we met Zacarie and her siblings, we knew that we could help.

difficulties gathering information, their paperwork stalled, and their case stopped moving forward with the Philippines Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). As the three girls were getting older, their previous shelter was limited in what they could provide and eventually sought their placement elsewhere.

At some point during their five-year stay at that facility, Zacarie

told us that she had suffered an injury and was taken to a government hospital in neighboring Talisay City. A physical therapist noted that her movements and daily

PLANNED GIVING BASICS

What is a planned gift anyway?

Any gift that requires planning is a “planned gift,” technically speaking, but the ones we reference have to do with charitable estate planning. Here are some more familiar examples you might recognize:

- Bequest through a Will or Revocable Trust
- Beneficiary of an IRA or Investment Account
- Beneficiary of a Life Insurance Policy
- TOD/POD of Real Property (home, land or farm)
- Charitable Gift Annuity

Some planned gifts have income and tax benefits for you today, while others may reduce the amount of taxes your estate or children will pay at the time

of your death. And if you’re planning to leave your estate to your children or other loved ones, there are advantages to leaving certain assets and pitfalls when leaving other assets.

We took her to a pediatric orthopedic surgeon, who determined that her arm had been previously fractured. The fracture was not set properly and healed incorrectly.

Hospitals reached capacity in a matter of weeks, and non-life-threatening or elective surgeries were put on hold. CSC and Zacarie were told that we would have to wait. Through it all, we continued to pray and continued to plan.

Just this past month, an opportunity presented itself.

It was the beginning of 2020 when Zacarie's surgery plans were made, and then the unexpected happened. A worldwide pandemic resulted in the Philippines being placed on the world's longest and strictest quarantine.

Fortunately, the problem was caught before Zacarie grew too old for it to be easily fixed. We were told that surgery was required to reset the bone, and that without surgery, it would continue to get worse.

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RECIPE FOR: MENUDO

Want to change up your summer cooking? **Here is a recipe we often make at the shelter.**

Ingredients

- 2 lbs. pork, cubed
- 4 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1 medium size onion, chopped
- 5 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 16 ounces tomato sauce
- 2 beef bullion cubes in 4 cups of water
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 bay leaves
- 5 hot dogs, sliced diagonally
- 1 big carrot, cubed
- 2 medium size potatoes, cubed
- 3/4 cups frozen green peas
- Salt and pepper to taste



Instructions

Heat oil in a cooking pot. When the oil is hot, add and sauté onions and garlic until onions are clear. Add pork and cook for 7 minutes on medium heat or until brown. Add raisins, tomato sauce, and beef broth. Bring to a boil. Add bay leaves. Simmer for 30-45 minutes or until pork is tender. Stir in hot dogs and let them cook for a minute or two. Stir in carrots and potatoes. Cook for 8-10 minutes. Add in green peas and cook for another 2 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve warm over rice.
