At CSC, we've had a prolonged "hard-work montage" play out over the past year and a half. As the Philippines continued its countrywide quarantine, and as the shelter continued its lockdown, everyone at CSC has been praying and preparing. We made plans and contingencies should the coronavirus find its way inside of our walls. Many long meetings, many nights of prayer, and many long phone calls have allowed us to prepare our defenses, train up our people, and prepare for the worst-case scenario. Our school, the Cebu Children of Hope School, was transformed into a quarantine facility. Employees began taking turns living on site for five to six weeks at a time. Personal protective

HEBRAWE RELIVING IN IV IS A DREAM OME TRUE e era we are ing in today ta dream equipment was stockpiled, and staff were trained on what to do should anyone begin to show signs of COVID-19.

Last month, our enemy arrived. One of our staff left our shelter after completing her weekslong rotation. Two days after leaving, she began to feel ill. We encouraged her to seek medical attention, and when she arrived at the local hospital she was tested for coronavirus. Her test results came back positive. With limited contact with others after hospital. They had come to test everyone inside of the shelter. As is procedure in the Philippines, the LGU completely locked down the shelter, putting caution tape on our gates and barring anyone from entering or exiting. We had made plans to ensure that supplies and support would continue flowing to the shelter in the event of a government-imposed lockdown and that communication, care, and necessities would not be interrupted. Last month, those Auntie Conie who volunteered to care for children who tested positive for coronavirus, even though she herself tested negative. Another is Auntie Jenelyn who cared for a cute two-year-old toddler 24/7 with no relief or replacement. They, and all the staff at CSC, are heroes. They stood their ground in the face of trial and difficulty.

All of you are also our heroes. Your prayers and support empower us to provide the care that our kids need. You are the

As of this newsletter printing, we've had 32 positive cases of CDVID inside the shefter (including staff and children). Thankfully, all of these individuals were either asymptomatic or had mild symptoms. We realize that we could have more positive cases of CDVID in the future, but we will continue to work to reduce further spread.

leaving CSC, we had to assume the worst.

We immediately put our plans into action. One of our homes— Cherne Home—was turned into an isolation area for any children or staff who tested positive. The local government (LGU) arrived at CSC's gates the day after the positive coronavirus test was reported by the plans were put to the test.

By the grace of God, our plans worked. They worked because CSC has its own heroes. These heroes don't wear capes, and they don't have superpowers. At CSC, our real heroes are the caregivers—"Aunties" and "Uncles" who have made it their purpose and priority to provide loving, Christ-centered care to our children no matter the circumstance. One example is muscle behind the heroic deeds of our caregivers. Thank you for helping us make it through one of the most difficult times we've faced during this pandemic. 

## CLASSROOM Highlights

We have 39 students from Preschool to Grade 6 at the Cebu Children of Hope School. Soon, our toddler program, which will include eight students, will start up again. We also have 20 junior high students attending school online through a local program and two students in an online high school program. The total number of students at CSC will be 69 as of the end of this calendar year. During lockdown, our teachers have had to get creative in finding appropriate classroom space and utilizing that space the best way they can for teaching!

Currently meeting: Home Life office | 4 Students The class is learning common and proper nouns through grammar, games and music, mathematical addition, and understanding that scientific inventions make our lives better.

Currently meeting: Duterte Home basement | 5 Students The class is learning words with prefixes, problem-solving using the three-part model, and learning to describe the different landforms in the Philippines and share their favorite landforms.

#### Teacher Kristine's class

Currently meeting: Gazebo near Cherne Home | 5 Students The class is learning what makes a good citizen, how to add whole numbers, and rounding.





#### Teacher Michelle's class

Currently meeting: Duterte Home living room | 9 Students The class is learning to use a TREE graphic organizer to plan a summary, multiplication, distributive property, and different types of models in science.

#### Teacher Merce's class

Currently meeting: Jerry and Eldie's office (next to the washroom) | 3 Students The class is learning decimal grids, comparing and contrasting the physical properties of two objects, peer editing, and more about the distribution of the population in the Philippines.
