Other sections followed our nurses and social workers on their rounds, making good things happen for the children of CSC.

Music for the evening was provided almost entirely by “home grown” talent. Beltran Holmberg, a talented eight

year-old who was adopted from CSC by Barb and Tim Holmberg of Minnesota in 2004, sang two songs. The various video presentations included songs by Kirk Pilapil and Arlene Lozada of our Wally Johnson Teen Home, and Joanna Aballe who is CSC’s attorney in Cebu. Piano music was provided during the meal by Angela Erickson.

As in the past, sponsorships were solicited so that we could offer the evening free of charge to our supporters. Talented volunteers helped in many ways including Doug Carlson, who painted the backdrop, Marcia Carlson, who planned the menu and all the table arrangements, and Chris Hansen, who, once again, did the video work for the banquet.

At the end of the evening an offering was taken, and just over \$70,000 came in for the ministry! Board members Kirby Stoll and Shari Reasoner were on stage to receive the exciting announcement of the offering total from long-time CSC friend Al Sannerud, whose accounting firm counted the offering in their typically speedy and accurate fashion.

Many thanks to all who participated in this memorable evening and to those who gave generously. We hope all were blessed by watching our children and staff in action in our great facilities in Cebu, providing loving care to the children who call CSC home.

If your child is old enough, he or she will send you an occasional letter. 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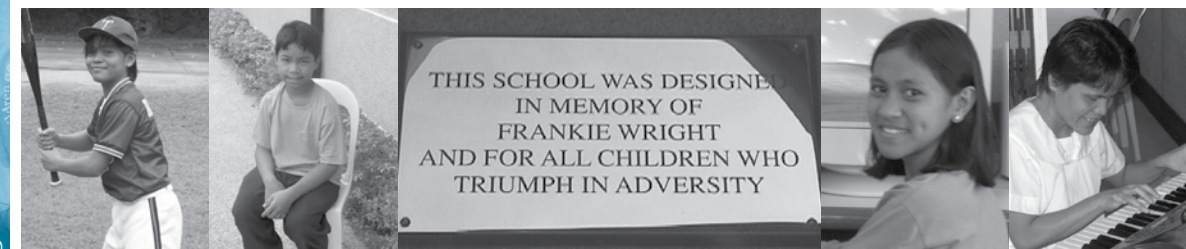
For All Children Who Triumph in Adversity

Roselyn and her younger brother were living in a government shelter when CSC learned about them. Her youngest brother was already living with us. They had been split up after their disabled father died. Before that, her mother had abandoned the family by going to Manila to live with her boyfriend. The children were left to fend for themselves, which meant that they had to beg to get food. Living in the shelter was not pleasant for Roselyn. She was treated cruelly by some of the staff and children there.



At CSC, Roselyn has found a place where she can live together with both her brothers and where

the despair and hopelessness of losing her parents she now has begun to think of the future, which is bright and full of possibilities for her and her siblings.

Jeson is an outgoing, bright 11 year-old. He and his two younger siblings came to live at CSC in May of 2005. Their mother had brought the children to Cebu from another island to protect them from the abusive and alcoholic father of the younger kids (Jeson's stepfather) who routinely beat them. Because he was not the biological child of this man, Jeson received the lion's share of the abuse.



Jeson is thriving at CSC! He is a wonderful big brother to his siblings, always aware of their needs and whereabouts. But he is learning to release their care to our staff and to reclaim his childhood. He is discovering lots of talents and interests and has become one of the major entertainers in the Eicher Home. With counseling and lots of love, he is well on the road to overcoming his abusive past and we look forward to his triumphant future!

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On The Flip Side

When I moved from Best Buy's headquarters to nonprofit work in a low-income part of Minneapolis, my new job came with a nice new benefit. Whenever I needed a recharge I could go downstairs and play basketball with the youth we served.

Getting beat by kids 2-3 feet shorter than I wasn't necessarily good for my ego, but a short time with them always reminded me why I moved from the corporate world—they! That benefit obviously changed a little when I was hired at CSC. I still get to see the kids, but those visits are separated by much more time and distance.

I'm very glad to have found a solution to my problem in adoptive families. Each and every time I get together with an adoptive family I leave reenergized for the ultimate purpose of all the work it takes to support our ministry in Cebu. It's such a joy, especially when I get to see kids that I met while visiting CSC.

CSC has had 430 kids adopted into 14 different countries, setting a record in 2005 with 32 children placed. Our hope for all 23 years we admit is that they will one day be adopted.

We just wrapped up our annual banquet weekend, which includes an adoptive family celebration on Friday. It's a great blessing to get to see so many of our kids reunited. Of course, the best ones are when kids see each other for the first time since leaving Cebu. It's always a fun and noisy night that's full of hugs and memories.

Another benefit of the event is the time our adoptive parents get to spend with each other. You can't ask for a much more amazing group of people than those who have adopted. They get to see each other, share together and celebrate their adoption experiences. We're so appreciative of every one of them.

I met a donor and adoptive parent a while back who owns a successful company. Pointing at his daughter from CSC he told me all the success he had in business could never match the change in the world he could have through that little girl. Amen to that.

Janice's family situation could only be described as complex. There were 11 children in the family. Two died. Her father was killed suddenly in a vehicular accident and the family, already living in poverty, was pushed to the point of hunger and despair. Through the interventions of nuns working in their community, two of her siblings were placed in a Catholic orphanage. An older sister went to Manila and another had a child as a teenager. Her younger twin siblings came to live at CSC and she was sent to live with a relative. Janice was observing the disintegration of her family and there was nothing she could do about it.



But God's plan for Janice brought her to CSC where she could live with two of her siblings and where, although separated from other family members, they could receive good food, medical care, love, spiritual guidance and a chance to go to school. This was just the opportunity Janice needed because she is a wonderfully talented young lady. Her desire is to become a teacher so that she can teach children about God. Another triumph in the making.

Arlene's triumphs have become a regular part of life at CSC for the past 23 years. She was blinded and then orphaned at a young age and has lived at CSC since 1983. Recently she walked across the stage to receive her high school diploma, a tremendous achievement for a student who has had to work at least twice as hard as her sighted classmates. With the help of tutors and staff at CSC, Arlene has become expert at Braille and has shown fearless determination to be able to navigate around the huge school campus. Blindness will not stop Arlene from reaching her goal of being a music teacher to the blind.

Adversity, in the form of the death of parents, poverty, abuse, abandonment and disabilities is an unfortunate reality for many children in the Philippines. CSC is a place where, in spite of these hardships, children can find opportunities for very different, unexpected and exciting outcomes in their lives. We provide the opportunities but the triumphs are theirs.



Your Gifts Buy Good Food For Our Children

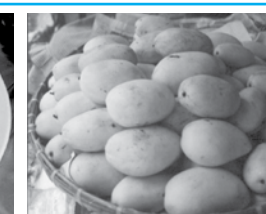
Although Americans might not recognize many of the foods that grace the tables at the shelter in Cebu, the meals are nutritious and tasty for the children. Some of the foods that are a regular part of "Filipinos' diets are: fish heads, rice noodles, pork belly, lumpia (Filipino egg rolls), mong beans, bean spouts,

Since Cebu City is on an island, seafoods are inexpensive and readily available, so our children are regularly served a variety of fish and squid dishes, as well as dried fish for breakfast. One local favorite is *kinilaw*, raw fish marinated in vinegar.

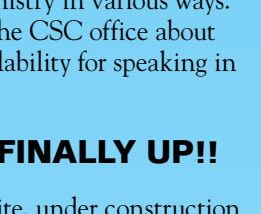

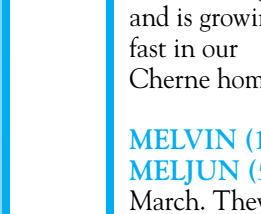

seaweed and coconut. All of these dishes can be found on the CSC menu sometime during the month. Our children enjoy eating fruits and vegetables that most Americans have never tasted, like *ampalaya* (similar to bitter melon), *kalamungay* and *alugbati* (small leaves used in soups) or that would be hard to find, like mangoes, guavas and papayas.

CSC children are generally not fussy eaters. Many of them grew up being hungry and malnourished, so are happy to have enough to eat and a chance to eat a variety of healthful and good tasting foods at every meal. Just about the only time they will complain is if rice isn't served with a meal!

Central Baptist Team Sponsors Camp for CSC Kids

35 CSC children were treated to a four day camp experience in February, compliments of a ministry team from Central Baptist Church of St. Paul, MN. Led by Ben Baltes, the team of nine planned and administered the camp, which included Bible lessons, creative games, music, crafts and good food. Since the facilities were right on the beach, swimming was a popular activity. For almost all of our children, this was their first time to experience camp. The camp was held at the ARC Christian Camp facilities near the town of Santander on the southern tip of Cebu. The children and staff enjoyed the three hour drive along the coast of Cebu.



This was the third team to come to Cebu from the church. Central Baptist is the home church of CSC staff members Paul Healy and Mitch Ohlendorf. school. She is excellent with the younger kids when she wants to be. She has had some jobs outside of CSC but has not been able to be consistent and capable in these.

JOHN RAY (11) and RUFA MAE (7) are not CSC kids but attend our school. They have a loving and committed Christian family. They have certainly become a part of the CSC family with their beautiful smiles and amazing outlook on life.

John and Rufa both have Osteogenesis Imperfecta or "brittle bone disease." They are both very capable academically but had not previously been able to attend school because of their condition. We are blessed to have them at our school and to be a part of their lives.
