## Children and Staff Live the Dream in New Medical Facility

Meeting the medical needs of our children is a crucial part of the ministry of CSC. Medical care is one of our largest budget items and requires the efforts of four nurses, not to mention house

parents, child care workers and staff. Getting children healthy is one of our highest priorities. And now we have facilities that help make this possible.

Our Frankie Wright Medical building has offices for our nursing staff, a laboratory, and six rooms for sick children. It is a first rate infirmary that allows us to give the best medical care possible to our children. It helps us meet a variety of needs that they present when they first come to live with us, and throughout their time in our care.







For years we have dreamed of having a first class medical facility, and now we have it! Although our new children would much rather not be isolated, they can at least spend that time in a place that was designed with their needs and care in mind. Contagious children can be kept separate from the others, and crying babies do not disrupt the sleep of other kids.

In the nurses office, Warlita, Arlyn, Jocelyn and Angelie have a spacious area for their Continued on page 2

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Right now four year-old Jovan is in Room 3, as he needs to be isolated while being treated for pneumonia. Two doors down is five-month-old Ciro who has conjunctivitis. Last week Sarah, a nine year old who was recently admitted, was in Room 4 with tonsilitis. Two months ago we had as many as eight children in the infirmary at one time, being treated for a variety of illnesses.

When Venus and her four younger siblings were admitted to CSC in Septem-

## YEAR-END FINANCIAL NEWS



I recently gave a speech introducing our ministry. I had five minutes, and honestly, I didn't feel that great about it. It's hard to encapsulate everything that CSC does in a five minute speech. There is just too much ground to cover.

Still, I gave it the old college try. I presented the extraordinary need in the community we serve, what a child can expect when they come into our care and how we prepare our children to leave us for an adoptive family one day. Even after several rounds of cuts, I rattled off quite a list of things in my five minutes. If I had it to do over again, I would have taken a different approach.

As I waited for the event to wrap up I wasn't expecting much to come of my talk. But as I chatted afterwards, a man approached me with a simple statement that took me back. In spite of all my self-criticism this man said something that ensured God had spoken to him regardless of my "performance." He said, "When you spoke you broke my heart to give me hope." It was a startling and profound statement that I committed to memory. This guy got something out of those five minutes that was way beyond my expectations. He learned something from my talk that I didn't even say.

I learned something, too. I was reminded of how God can work in our insufficiencies, and how much our work really is His. There is heartbreak all around CSC. There is brokenness at the core of the needs that we meet. But somehow that brokenness leads to something: hope, with new possibilities and a second chance at life. Our hearts should be broken for the orphaned children we serve, but it doesn't have to be an empty brokenness. Because it leads somewhere better. It's the hope of safety, medicine and consistent meals. It's the hope of family. But more than anything, it's the hope of Christ.

Every year at CSC it comes down to this. Budget creation for the coming year? Yes. The harried pace of Christmas in Cebu? Most definitely. Then there's the one that really keeps us on our toes: we're entering the most critical financial quarter in our year. As always, we will be praying, watching and trusting God will work through people's giving. In order to make budget for 2011, we will need to bring in \$397,000. It's a big number, and we simply don't know where it will come from, but we've most definitely learned that God provides for us exactly as we need. It's been a good year when it comes to income. We've found

comes to income. We've found that more people have given up to this point in 2011 than had at this time in 2010. That's cause for celebration. We are also continuing our growth in the Combined

Federal Campaign, the program that allows federal employees to designate their giving to charities of their choosing. On top of that, we've had some generous gifts to meet specific projects in Cebu. Where we're seeing the impact of the down economy is in the area of how much people are able to give. We're noticing people have kept their commitment to our mission, but some aren't able to give as much. We're so thankful that people are standing by us even when their personal income has been impacted by the slow market. As always, we wait to see what God has in store. We continue to work hard for our kids, and we will continue to fight for them in every way we can. We are able to do this thanks to all of you who stand with us all over the world. Thanks so much...and here's to a great end to 2011!

desks and room for regular team meetings with Marlys Healy, CSC's Medical Director. Children can come to be measured and weighed, examined or given immunizations. Both the office and the lab on the other side of the reception area are air-conditioned, providing a comfortable working environment. The lab is a big enough room for meetings and seminars with child care workers, where they can sharpen their skills in assisting with the medical care of the children in the homes. Marlys Healy, CSC's Founder and Medical Director since the ministry began in 1979, sums up the







who loves to be held. He also loves to eat. He recognizes his name and will smile when anyone talks to him. He is very ticklish. Zaisean was recently hospitalized with pneumonia.



(nine **Nicole** months) came to live in the Duterte Home at CSC when she was six months old. She is a beautiful little girl with curly hair.

She had been living in a government center in Cebu City. She is very observant and smiley and will flail her arms and legs when someone talks to her. She has a boil on her head which is being treated with medicine. She will be starting physical therapy soon to address some concerns about her lack of neck movement.

Epifanio (10) and Mark (4) have lived at CSC for almost four months. They have made a good adjustment to living at CSC and are very active and healthy. Epifanio is known as JunJun by everyone at CSC. He is a very sweet guy

who is guick to smile. He really craves adult attention. He loves to play basketball with the older boys when they will let him. He also likes playing marbles. He does careful work in school and is very artistic. Mark is often a very serious guy but he really smiles when playing his favorite games, like bubbles or toy cars. He cries easily when he doesn't get his way. His favorite activity is riding a scooter around the yard. He really goes fast and has good control of where he's going. He recently had his fourth birthday and



was excited to get a gift. One of his presents was a coloring book that included masks. The next morning

he was seen riding his scooter with a brightly colored mask on his face!

Isaiah (six months) has lived with us for just over a month. He was born on another island and was brought



to Cebu on a ship as a newborn. He loves to eat and is a chubby and happy child. He is very expressive and tracks well. He loves to be held in an upright

position and tests out his leg muscles by bouncing. He is very interested in everything that goes on around him.

Venus (11), Sarah (9), Marco (6) and twins Marky and Marty (4) took CSC by storm in mid-September. They needed to stay in isolation for an extended time so they were very ready to join the other kids when the time was right. Venus is very mature and takes good care of her siblings. She made friends fast and has done well in school. Sarah is very talkative and moody. She had to go back into isolation just a few days after moving into the Eicher Home, and was not a bit happy about that. She is very expressive and fun-loving when she's in the mood. Marco is really enjoying life at CSC. He is very active



and enjoys interacting with adults. He is doing very well in school, having had some schooling before coming to CSC. The twins are extremely active! They have settled down a lot in their month with us but they still keep all the caregivers hopping. Markie is more mature and calmer than Marty, who throws tantrums to get his way at home and in pre-school.

One of the difficult jobs our staff faces is handling the referrals that come in on a regular basis. Recently we have had a lot of requests for us to take in children. Often these referrals come before a baby is even born. Our social workers handle the referrals, gather information, make case summaries and make recommendations to the senior staff.

Because of limited space, we are not able to accept all the children re-

ferred to us. Though some referrals are babies, toddlers or single children, others involve sibling groups, sometime large ones. Our staff has to determine if space is available and if there is sufficient manpower to handle another child. Then they tackle the job of prioritizing the referrals on the basis of need. It isn't easy to say no to a referral, knowing as they do, that there might not be another good option for the child(ren).

### **Volunteers and Staff Meet to Keep CSC on Course**

It takes a whole lot of meetings to run a ministry like CSC. On a given day there might be as many as 10 meetings going. In the U.S., our board and its various committees meet regularly to set policy and to help

manage the finances of the ministry. Our staff of three meets often in Minnesota to coordinate efforts and see that all the support work

is being done.

Currently our Administrative Committee is working on salary and retirement plans for our staff. Our Long-Range Plan-

ning Committee is proposing some organizational changes, while our Development Committee brainstorms fund raising ideas. We have committees that are working on policies concerning adoption issues and planning our annual banquet. Our Finance Committee will



soon be looking at our 2012 budgets and preparing for Often audits. our CSC staff will "sit in" on the stateside meetings via Skype. We have talented and dedicated people meeting regularly

to see that CSC continues to be a ministry of integrity and vision.

In Cebu, there are important

meetings every day. Staff meet together, or with the counselors, nurses and house parents, to see that the needs of the children are being met

in the best and most efficient ways. Children's needs are discussed and they are prayed for.

Every meeting, conference or Skype call has as its ultimate purpose to help CSC take excellent care of the kids who live in our homes.

#### **Brenda Leaf Retires**

There are lots of unsung heroes at CSC: the security guards who keep watch at the shelter; the laundry workers who wash



the piles of clothes and diapers each day, and the people who give to the shelter from far away. Without heroes in unexpected places, we wouldn't be able to do what we do.

We're saying goodbye to one of those heroes in the next few months. After eight years serving in the U.S. office, Brenda Leaf is retiring. She will be greatly missed. Brenda has been a wonderful member of the CSC family. She's been a kind voice on the phone, the author of personal notes on gift receipts and consistently one to go the extra mile for whatever project she has worked on. We will miss her greatly, but look forward to seeing her around in the coming years.

Brenda, you have been a tremendous blessing to our team, and to each of those precious kids you helped serve. Thank you for your exceptional service.
